Festival Adjudicator.....Jane Carnwath

Jane Carnwath has had a long career in the theatre as a director, actor, teacher and adjudicator.

She has adjudicated community and student theatre festivals all over Canada. In fact, last year's tour of duty at QUONTA allows her to claim that now she's adjudicated at least one festival for every community theatre region in Ontario.

For Theatre Ontario she has led workshops on acting and directing, and served as script and production consultant for several professional and community theatres. Jane taught acting for the Music Theatre

Department at Sheridan College in Oakville, until she left recently to concentrate on directing and adjudication.

Her most recent directing projects were the Toronto premiere of Dave Carley's AFTER YOU and an acclaimed production of Elliot Hayes' HOMEWARD BOUND, both for the Alumnae Theatre.

For several years she was a writer-director-performer with composer R. Murray Schafer's ongoing wilderness-theatre project, AND WOLF SHALL INHERIT THE MOON, an enterprise that involves weeklong camping in the bush, an original, if somewhat physically challenging - and occasionally soggy - way to create theatre.

Dennis is a director and adjudicator with thirty years experience as an educator and fifteen years experience with the Sears Drama Festival as an adjudicator at the District and Regional Levels. He was educated in Ontario Universities as well as New York, California and England, and holds an M.A. in Educational Theatre. A wideranging teaching career includes Drama Qualifications courses for University of Toronto and Brock University, as well as a Circus Skills course at the Maggie Bassett Studio. Dennis has served on various Theatre Ontario committees and served as President of Ontario's Drama Teachers (CODE) for three years. Recent directing credits include Jesus Christ Superstar and The King and I at the River Run Centre, Guelph. Recent adjudication assignments include the Western Ontario Drama League (2002-2003) and the musical category for the 2004-2005 ACT-CO Festival.

Director's Notesby William W. Kenner

Author Robert Harling created an autobiographical treasure in his play Steel Magnolias of which is based on the tragic experience of Harling's sister, Susan. Like the character Shelby, she died at an early age as a result of complications caused by diabetes following the birth of her only child. The play is dedicated to her, and is meant by the author to provide his nephew with a living image of his lost parent, and "a sense of his past." The play also honors Harling's mother who, like the character M'Lynn, donated a kidney to her daughter in a transplant operation that ultimately failed. The setting of our production is as an expression of many of the social and cultural values reflecting the place where these women come to laugh, cry, and pray. Real magnolia blossoms are beautiful but short-lived, easily destroyed by time and the elements. A steel magnolia, however, is an altogether tougher thing.

DIRECTOR'S NOTE:

When Arthur Miller wrote this play, he did so not only to shed light on the events of the Salem witch hunt of 1692, but also in response to the so-called McCarthy witch hunt of the 1950s. While The Crucible's characters and fates are drawn from history, their motivations are Miller's own and this story of human frailty and strength should serve as both a warning and an inspiration. As Miller wrote, "we are what we always were," and only the trappings of our time separate us from those who came before us, and those who will follow.

In Memory of Kay McKie

It is with regret that we note the passing of Kay McKie. Below is an extract from her obituary

Kay passed away quietly at home after a brief illness, on Friday, September 29, 2006. Kay was the cherished wife of William McKie and loving mother to the late Robert and Bruce (Susan); as well as proud grandmother to Evan, Raymond, Philippe and Cedric. Kay was born 84 years ago in Owen Sound. She developed a passion for drama at school where she acted and ultimately directed live theatre. After moving to Guelph in the early 1950s, she worked extensively with the Guelph Little Theatre where her skill as a director coupled with her creativity, technical savvy and charisma, helped her to draw upon the wonderful talents of cast and crew, (aided by her innovative engineer-husband Bill). She went on to win the award for Best Director at Canada's Dominion Drama Festival with a GLT production. Having reached this pinnacle of directing success, Kay moved to teaching drama at John F. Ross Collegiate where her knowledge, experience and passion seeded a highly professional educational experience for many students. Her kindness and encouragement led many to refer to her as "Mom" and to approach their own learning and careers with a passion that they might never have achieved without the experience. After her teaching career Kay worked as a Director, Adjudicator and Life Member of Theatre Ontario and ultimately received a Woman of Distinction Lifetime Achievement Award. While we will all miss this incredible lady and mentor, we are thankful of the joys and knowledge that she bestowed upon us. Her memory and teaching will endure forever.

Message from the Director:

Live theatre is to be experienced. Audiences are not simply passive observers but are actively involved, participating in a struggle of epic proportions. "Death of a Salesman" is about a struggle between hope, confusion, aspiration and circumstance. The play has been a struggle to understand, to conceptualize, to develop and to produce. The play is not about resolution. As with all great theatre, it asks more questions than it answers. Our understanding of the questions lies in our appreciation of suffering as part of the human condition. Thus our task is to participate in suffering.

We as cast and crew have been on this journey of discovering "Salesman" since October, some of us since last July. The journey has been long and the discoveries have been many. The risk-taking has been monumental. The trust has been awe-inspiring. The participants' love for their craft, for this great play, and their support for each other has been inspirational. I am very grateful for the opportunity to be part of this project.

Ladies and gentlemen, we give you "Death of a Salesman". Do with it what you will.
