SANDY MACDONALD




Sandy Macdonald is a director, actor and acting coach with some four decades of experience working in theatre, in both England and Canada. He has been Artistic Director of the Lighthouse Festival Theatre in Port Dover and of the Huron Country Playhouse in Grand Bend, as well as Associate Director/Producer of Rainbow Theatre in Parry Sound and Theatre Muskoka. Among his favourite directing credits are "The Importance Of Being Earnest', 'Private Lives', 'Educating Rita', 'Shirley Valentine', 'Little Shop Of Horrors', 'Nunsense' and 'A Funny Thing Happened On The Way To The Forum',

Sandy has worked as a director and workshop leader with community theatre groups in several cities and towns across the province, including Kanata, Woodstock, Ingersoll, Sudbury and Peterborough, to name a few. As well, he has adjudicated for ACT-CO, WODL, QUONTA and EODL as well as the Sears Drama Festival and the New Brunswick Drama League.

Sandy's acting experience includes seasons at Lincoln and Windsor Repertory Theatres, and the Chichester Festival Theatre, in England. At the latter, he had the privilege of working with two of Britain's greatest names in theatre, Sir Alec Guinness and Sir Peter Ustinov. His acting credits include Willie Clark in "The Sunshine Boys', Jack in 'Brighton Beach Memoirs' and Herb in 'I Ought To Be In Pictures'. He is particularly proud of two cameo roles, Merriman in "The Importance of Being Earnest' on stage and a soldier in the classic action film, "The Dirty Dozen'.

John P. Kelly



John P. Kelly arrived to live in Ottawa in 2004 after a long and varied career in theatre and broadcasting in his native Ireland. He trained originally with the famous Abbey Theatre in Dublin and his direction work has been seen in most of the major theatres (and many minor) in his home country.

He also worked for Ireland's National Broadcaster, beginning as a Light Entertainment and Drama director and rising to the position of Managing Editor for Features and Arts, holding responsibility for the Station's Arts output. For five years, he resided in Switzerland, working with the European Broadcasting Union.

Since arriving in Canada, John has created a professional theatre company dedicated to modern Irish theatre and has produced and directed fourteen shows over three years. The company is now resident in the new Gladstone Theatre. He received the best professional director award for 2007 from the Ottawa Theatre Critics and was nominated again in 2008. He was also nominated for the inaugural Rideau Theatre Awards.

He is a past member of the British Association of Drama Adjudicators and a founder member of the Irish equivalent, The Association of Drama Adjudicators. On this side of the great pond, he has adjudicated in Eastern and Western Ontario and in Toronto, and conducted theatre workshop sessions for groups from several parts of Ontario. Last season he adjudicated the Theatre Ontario Finals in North Bay and two seasons ago, he remembers a wonderful time at the WODL finals in Owen Sound.
